According to the Autism Society of America, Autism is a complex developmental disability that typically appears during the first three years of life. It is the result of a neurological disorder that affects the normal functioning of the brain, impacting development in the areas of social interaction and communication skills. Both children and adults with autism typically show difficulties in verbal and non-verbal communication, social interactions, and leisure or play activities.

This eight week studio project involved a series of collaborative interdisciplinary lectures and presentations addressing key issues relevant to autism and design features to apply in creating a safe and supportive non-threatening interior.
